Summary:	The Churaevka Russian Village Collection contains correspondence, printed materials, photographs, manuscripts by Georgii Grebenshchikov and other authors, press releases and various advertisement materials related to Alatas publishing house and Churaevka, a Russian village in Connecticut. The collection focuses on Russian émigré life in the United States and reflects émigré life of Russian novelist Georgii Grebenshchikov (1883-1964).

## INTRODUCTION

#### Historical Note

Georgii Grebenshchikov (1883-1964) was a Russian writer from the Tomsk region in Siberia. In 1917, he married Tatiana Stadnik, whom he met when she acted in a play he wrote. In 1920, he escaped from Russia with the White army and spent several years in Paris. In 1924, Grebenshchikov left France and settled down in the United States. In 1925, together with Leo Tolstoy's son Il'ia Tolstoy, Georgii Grebenshchikov founded the Churaevka village in Southbury, Connecticut for Russian émigré writers and intellectuals. He later became a director of the Alatas publishing house and professor at Florida Southern College where he taught creative writing and Russian literature. In addition to *Churaevy*, Grebenshchikov writings include the novel *The Turbulent Giant* (1940) and *Life of Egorka* (Egorkina zhizn') published posthumously in 1966.

#### History of the Papers and Their Organization

In 2008, the Churaevka Russian Village Collection was donated to the Amherst Center for Russian Culture by Mieke Maas Crider.

## DESCRIPTION OF THE COLLECTION

#### Scope and Content Note

The Churaevka Russian Village Collection contains correspondence, professional, research, personal material, photographs and documents related to the Churaevka Russian village in Connecticut. Also included are newspaper and journal clippings, announcements and programs about Russian émigré life, writings by Grebenshchikov and other authors and materials about the Alatas publishing house. The collection will be of particular interest to scholars studying the history of Russian literature in the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century and Russian émigré life in the United States.

#### Organization and Arrangement

The Churaevka Russian Village Collection is organized into five series:

#### Series Descriptions

Series 1: CORRESPONDENCE (1921-1989) contains letters and notes to Georgii Grebenshchikov, Leo Nolde, M.A. Obolensky, and others.

**Series 2, WRITINGS (n.d.)** consists of typescripts by Georgii Grebenshchikov, M.A. Obolensky, Irina Yagmina and unidentified authors.

Series 3, PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES (n.d.), includes information on the Alatas publishing house, receipts, historical maps and other documents on the history of Churaevka, as well as personal documents of some residents.

Series 4, PHOTOGRAPHS (1906-2000) consists of photos of Georgii Grebenshchikov, Il'ia Tolstoy, Nicholas Roerich, and others.

Series 5, PRINTED MATERIALS (1921-1938) contains brochures, broadsides, newspaper clippings, pamphlets, postcards, programs, publicity material, and invitations.
