## INTRODUCTION

#### Historical Note

Osip Emilyevich Mandelshtam (1891-1938) was born in Warsaw, Poland (then under the control of the Russian Empire), although his family moved to St. Petersburg shortly after Osip's birth. Although he studied at the Sorbonne in Paris, the University of Heidelberg in Germany and the University of St. Petersburg, Mandelstam never completed a formal degree before moving on to a full-time career as a writer. He quickly established himself as a major figure of the Acmeist poetic school (other members including Nikolai Gumilev, Mikhail Kuzmin, Anna Akhmatova and Georgii Ivanov). In 1919 he met Nadezhda Khazina (1899-1980) at a nightclub in Kiev, and the two married three years later.

In 1934, Osip was arrested and exiled from the major cities of the Soviet Union. He and Nadezhda lived in Voronezh until his second arrest in 1938. Osip subsequently died in a transit camp near Vladivostok, while Nadezhda took up a near-nomadic life to avoid being arrested herself. When her husband was rehabilitated in the early 1960s, Nadezhda was allowed to return to Moscow, where she began to write her memoirs. The first volume, *Hope Against Hope* (Vospominaniya), first circulated in *samizdat* form in the Soviet Union before being published in the West in 1970. A second volume, *Hope Abandoned* (Vtoraya kniga), followed in 1974. Nadezhda Mandelshtam later died at her home in Moscow in 1980.

## History of the Papers and Their Organization

In 1991, the Osip and Nadezhda Mandelshtam Collection was donated to the Amherst Center for Russian Culture by Thomas Whitney, AC Class of 1937.

## DESCRIPTION OF THE COLLECTION

#### Scope and Content Note

The Osip and Nadezhda Mandelshtam Collection consists of transcripts of letters of poet and essayist Osip Mandelshtam, and photocopies of the original Russian typescripts for Nadezhda Mandelshtam's two books of memoirs, *Hope Against Hope* and *Hope Abandoned*.
