INTRODUCTION

Historical Note

Georgii V. Golokhvastov (1882-1963), was born to a prominent Russian noble family. In 1902, he graduated from the Corps of Pages, a prestigious military school for the boys of noble families. He took part in World War I and in 1916 was sent abroad as a member of the Russian Procurement Committee. He never returned to Russia. He lived and worked in New York, first as a representative of the Russian Imperial Army in the United States and then as a free-lance writer. At the end of 1920s, he became a chair of the New York branch of the Russian Poetry Society. He extensively published and is well known for his narrative poem "Gibel' Atlantidy" and translation in contemporary Russian language of "Slovo o polku Igoreve." He died in New York City in 1963.

History of the Papers and Their Organization

In 1991, the Georgii Golokhvastov Papers were donated to the Amherst Center for Russian Culture by Thomas Whitney, AC Class of 1937, as part of the Anatolii Tarasenkov Collection.

In 2013, the Golokhvastov Papers were removed from the Tarasenkov Collection to be cataloged and housed separately.

DESCRIPTION OF THE COLLECTION

Scope and Content Note

The Georgii Golokhvastov Papers contain correspondence, manuscripts, subject folders, newspaper clippings and other printed materials documenting professional activities of Georgii Golokhvastov in exile. This collection will be of particular interest to scholars studying the history of Russian literature in Exile.
