INTRODUCTION

Historical Note

Georgii I. Novitskii (1889-1966), was a prominent Russian émigré and active member of many American émigré organizations. He chaired such bodies as Obshchestvo Pomoshchi Russkim Detiam za Rubezhom, Obshchestvo Druzei Akademii Sviatogo Sergeia, and the Russian-American Republican Club. His collection consists of appeals, correspondence, lectures, manuscripts, printed materials, and scrap notes. There are many letters from Anton Kartashev related to his trip to the United States; other correspondents include Sergei Bulgakov and Mikhail Karpovich. There are manuscripts by A. Kartashev and B. Petrovich, as well as lectures by Sergei Bulgakov on the Orthodox Church in exile. One subject folder contains materials related to the death of General Anton Denikin and a Memorial Committee to honor his life.

History of the Papers and Their Organization

In 1991, the Georgii Novitskii Collection was donated to the Amherst Center for Russian Culture by Thomas Whitney, AC Class of 1937.

DESCRIPTION OF THE COLLECTION

Scope and Content Note

The Georgii Novitskii Collection contains appeals, correspondence, lectures, manuscript, newspaper clippings and other printed materials documenting professional activities of Georgii Novitskii in exile. This collection will be of particular interest to scholars studying the history of Russian Orthodox Church in Exile.
