#### INTRODUCTION

### **Historical Note**

Sophia Zernov was born in Moscow on December 24, 1899. She fled Russia with her family in 1921, first to Constantinople, and then to Serbia. Zernov finished the Faculty of Philosophy at Belgrade University in 1925.

Zernov moved to Paris in 1925, where she became active in various Russian émigré relief, educational and religious organizations. She served as the General Secretary of the Russian Student Christian Movement (*Russkoe studencheskoe khristianskoe dvizheniie*) from 1925-1931, and from 1932-34 headed the employment office of the Russian All-Military Union (*Russkii obshche-voinskii soiuz*, ROVS). In 1935, Zernov founded the Center of Help to Russian Refugees in France (*Tsentr pomoshchi russkim v emigratsii*, Centre d'aide aux réfugiés russes en France), and was General Secretary of this organization from 1935-1969. In 1939, Zernov opened an orphanage for Russian children in Montgeron outside of Paris. She was also involved in the Anglican-Orthodox Fellowship of St. Alban and St. Sergius.

Sophia's brother Nikolai (1898-1980) and his wife Militsa (1899-1994) were also involved with various religious-intellectual émigré organizations France, and later England, where Nikolai taught at Oxford University and wrote several books on Russian Orthodoxy and ecumenism. Sophia's sister Maria (1902-1965) was married to Gustave Kullmann (1894-1961), a leader in the YMCA's work among Russians. Sophia's brother Vladimir (1904-?) was a doctor.

Sophia Zernov died in Paris on January 18, 1972.

### History of the Papers and Their Organization

In 1991, the Sophia Zernov papers were donated to the Amherst Center for Russian Culture by Thomas Whitney (AC class of 1937).

Custodial History: The Sophia Zernov Papers were housed with the following collections: The Russian Pedagogical Society in France Records, the M.M. Chatayu-Korvinoy Papers, the G.I. Novitsky Papers, the Zarochintsev Papers, the Cossack Bank Records, and the Kolokol'nikov Papers.

#### DESCRIPTION OF THE PAPERS

### Scope and Content Note

The Sophia Zernov Papers contain professional, research, personal, published material and correspondence related to Zernov's work with Russian émigré relief organizations in the 1930s, most notably the Center of Help to Russian Refugees in France. The collection reflects Zernov's work on a broad range of assistance programs and collaboration with organizations and individuals in France, England, Switzerland and America. The collection traces the beginning of the Center's work with the Bern Relief Organization for Refugee Children (Bernisches Hilfswerk für Emigrantenkinder), which sent Russian émigré children to Switzerland for the summer. Included here is Zernov's frequent correspondence with her counterpart in Bern, Suzanne Blum. Letters of thanks from children Zernov's organization sent to Switzerland and England are also included.

The collection contains Zernov's professional and personal correspondence from the 1930s, such as a series of letters she wrote to Konstantin Nikolaevich (Kovarsky?). There are letters from friends and donors in England and America, inducing her "Russian mother" Mary Baker, who Zernov befriended during a trip to the USA in 1928. Included also are letters from Sophia Zernov's siblings, especially her sister Maria.
